
MMS Winter Blue Popcorn and Bingo


Upcoming Book Study

SDAMLE Summer Book Study Opportunity

Based on the text *The Standards-Based Classroom: Make Learning the Goal*, this (1-credit, \$45 through USF) course will explore the steps for implementing standards-based practices in the classroom including an emphasis on diverse student needs and subject areas.

Workshop Objectives:

Educators will gain an overview of standards-based curriculum practices and will implement these practices in a draft unit using the four sections of the text: Articulate Desired Results, Develop Targeted Assessments, Design Effective Instruction, and Monitor and Communicate Learning.



Evaluation Criteria:

Participants in this course will reflect on text chapters by discussing book sections in a small group team, developing their own standards-based unit, and sharing unit components throughout the class.

Weekly discussion participation (50%) and completed unit components (50%) will be given completion grades for each section of the text.

Tara's Tech Tip

GIZMOS- Making Earth Science Fun!

GIZMOS is a program supported by the SD Dept. of Education. To access this you will need to work with your SBAC testing coordinator as it needs to be accessed through TIDE <u>https://sd.portal.cambiumast.com/</u>

Rotations (turns), reflections (flips), and translations (slides) are known as isometric transformations because they preserve the size and shape of figures. In fact, the word "isometric" comes from the Greek word "isometria," meaning "equality of measure."

In the Rotations, Reflections, and Translations Gizmo, students can explore the relationship between a shape and its isometric transformation on a coordinate plane. They can choose a figure type (either a point, a segment, a triangle, or a quadrilateral) and then choose how they want to transform the figure (either rotate it around the origin, reflect it over the x- or y-axis, or translate it). The measuring tools under the graph can be used by students to confirm that the preimage (original figure) and image (the transformed figure) are congruent. As students drag the vertices of the preimage, they will see the vertices of the image change and observe that the two figures are always the same size and shape.




Teach Kids to 'Read' the Images They See

Every day, images pass across our screens. They exist everywhere: on television, webpages, social media, newspapers, magazines, textbooks, mobile phones and more.

Photographic images get attention in the 21st century. They get respect. They can teach.

In Social Studies, for example, they are considered "primary sources." In English Language Arts, they are the "non-print informational texts" that teachers use. And in the Visual Arts, they are art forms – media that students will analyze for technique and creative value.



Photos are so ubiquitous, we often don't give them much thought. Who took that picture? (authorship); why did they take it? (purpose); where is it seen? (media, exposure); what message might it convey? (interpretation); has it been altered and if so, why? (creative expression, manipulation).

These are the kinds of "media literacy" questions that students should be taught to consider as they encounter photos in the news, in marketing situations, in social media.

Assessing with Instructional Integrity Before, During and After the Pandemic

Build it and They Will Come

The need for quality assignments is constant, but particularly important during pandemic learning. When a considerable number of students have late, incomplete, and missing assignments, educators have a professional obligation to examine their assessments to determine if they are instructionally sound and worthy of the time and effort required for students to complete them.

It has been our experience that if teachers construct quality assessments, students will complete them to the best of their abilities. When students submit assessments on time, teachers can more appropriately provide specific, timely, and actionable feedback. This may lead to instructional adjustments and prescribing specific and targeted extra practice for students to build self-confidence and ultimately achieve greater learning. Therefore, we must ensure our assessments possess instructional integrity.

Standards for Quality Assignments

But how do we know that we've constructed a quality assessment? To empower learning, every assessment, especially those included in grades, must provide accurate evidence of student achievement. Author Jan Chappuis, In *Seven Strategies of Assessment for Learning*, author Jan Chappuis suggests students are truly empowered if assessments help them to answer the three learning questions:

- 1. Where am I going?
- 2. Where am I now?
- 3. What do I need to close the gap or get better?

Essentially there are only three standards for a quality assessment that helps answer those driving questions: clear learning goals, clear purpose, and sound design. Let's look at each of these in more detail, and be sure to download the **Quality Assignment Checklist**.



LEAD with Instructional Rounds by Vicki Wilson

A practical guide to instructional rounds for educators

Isolation is a pervasive characteristic of life for a teacher in a modern school. Teachers meet in professional learning communities, attend trainings, and are even observed by administrators while they teach, but they rarely get the chance to see what other teachers do in the classroom. When the bell rings, they find themselves alone with their students.

Instructional rounds can counter that isolation. The idea itself—centered around teachers observing and providing feedback on each others' teaching—is relatively simple, but as Vicki Wilson shows, the effects are profound: Observing educators pick up new ideas. Observed teachers




experience a confidence boost. New school-wide instructional initiatives can be adopted more quickly. And broader school-improvement goals can be supported with concrete examples. Most important of all, instructional rounds rescue teachers from isolation by fostering a shared sense of mission and growing trust between fellow educators, who realize they have a team that supports and values them. Wilson's willingness to be honest about the process she implemented in her own school—the moments of doubt, the ups and downs, the mistakes and successes—transforms this practical book into something inspiring




